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 he seventh Geneva Writers' Conference welcomes writers from around the world to a weekend of workshops led by well-known authors, editors, agents, and publishers from Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Switzerland, the UK, and the USA.

The goal is to bring together English-language writers for high-level instruction, support and feedback through workshops, discussions, and readings. The Conference instructors are experienced in teaching creative writing and committed to sharing their knowledge, skills, and perspectives on writing as an art and as a profession.

The program offers a choice of writing workshops in fiction, nonfiction, and poetry. There will be two panel discussions on the Business of Writing (with agents, editors and publishers), two on Writing on the Web, two critiquing workshops, three Question & Answer sessions with instructors and panelists, and an evening of readings by the instructors. The Conference Bookshop will be open all weekend.

The Conference will take place at Webster University, Bellevue, ten minutes by car or train from the center of Geneva. Details of hotels in Geneva and means of transportation will be sent to those who register.

There will be a literary tour of Geneva's Old Town on Friday afternoon (numbers limited, prior reservation essential). The opening buffet supper for participants and staff will include an hour and a half of readings by participants (numbers limited, advanced sign-up required).

The registration fee for the Conference is CHF180 and includes:

#### **Fiction:**

**Martina Evans**, prize-winning novelist and poet, was born in Cork and now lives in London. #### **Fiction:**

#### (1) Where Film Meets Fiction, Martina Evans:

This workshop encourages writers to think like film-makers—a fresh approach that encourages the development of dramatic narratives and encourages writers to become confident directors of their own work. Students will use techniques such as Slow Motion, Flashback or Crowd Scenes to create vivid intense narratives.

## (2) Getting Spontaneous: How to Use Coincidence in Fiction, Thomas E. Kennedy:

Spontaneous and coincidental incidents that occur in real life while we write sometimes want to enter our creative process. Is that acceptable? Most definitely! This workshop will discuss positive aspects of the phenomenon, consider examples and offer exercises in utilizing it.

#### (3) Time Management in Story, Geeta Kothari:

The scene is a small unit of time expanded; summary is a long period of time compressed. This workshop will focus balancing scene and summary. What constitutes a good scene? What makes a scene stall or lose momentum? We'll discuss the use of dialogue and blocking, character development and micro-plotting.

# (4) Writing for Children (and Adults), Richard Scrimger:

Stories are lies, but they reveal truth. And they begin with truth. Our focus will be on creating character from the inside and outside, so that your story springs to life from the people in it. My presentations are interactive. There will be some standing on chairs and a lot of laughing. By the end you will know more about your hero and yourself.



#### **Nonfiction:**

#### (5) Crafting the Truth, Annette Kobak:

You have some attraction, as yet unfathomed, to someone's life, to a journey, to an aspect of your life. How do you most faithfully, and most artfully, allow your material to find its form? Targeted exercises and examples encourage you to discover what you want to say, and then craft it into art.

### (6) Write Where You Are: Crafting Place in Nonfiction, Robert Root:

A sense of place is vital to essays, memoirs, cultural criticism, travel narratives, nature essays, and reportage. In this workshop we examine ways to inhabit, revisit, and explore place, first noting how other writers create a nonfiction of place, then engaging in strategies that anchor us in our own places.

# (7) Memoir, A Window into Your Life, Susan Tiberghien:

By choosing the focus, memoir becomes a window into your life. What window are you opening? What is its frame? Working with these questions, with examples of contemporary memoirs and guided exercises, you will move forward on a memoir already started, or start a new one. Your life has many windows.

#### **Poetry:**

#### (8) Prose Poems, John Hartley Williams:

Definition: A composition in prose bearing features of the lyric, that's to say more pronounced effects of imagery, and density of expression. It is usually short and compact, rarely extending to more than a printed page. We will

consider style and versification, and look at some contemporary prose poems before writing.

#### (9) Letting Objects Speak, Wallis Wilde-Menozzi:

Poetry needs a 'thou' in order to expand the 'I' or personal voice that drives poetry. We will try to animate some objects in nature and also animate some objects that are man-made. Then we will bring them together with our own voice and write a bigger poem.

#### **Critiquing:**

(10) Critiquing: This workshop will be devoted to critiquing unpublished work. The first writers to register will be given 10 minutes each to read their own work, and 10 minutes for critiques by panelists and other writers.

#### **Panel Discussions:**

These take place during the workshop sessions.

(11) The Business of Writing: David Applefield, Jane Dystel, Robert Stewart, Karolina Sutton, What are the roles of agents, editors, and publishers? What do they look for in a writer? How does a manuscript finally get published?

#### (12) Writing on the Web: Catherine Nelson-Pollard, Alistair Scott, John Zimmer

How to create and develop your online voice, discover writing markets, and publicize your work through the medium of the internet—websites, blogs, e-zines, e-books, Facebook, and more.

#### **Question & Answer Periods:**

These periods are open (not necessary to register). They will allow for contact with the instructors and panelists.
